



COLONEL JAY M. PARKER, Ph.D.

Colonel Jay Morgan Parker, Ph.D. (United States Army) is Professor of Political and International Affairs and Director of International Relations and National Security Studies, Department of Social Sciences, United States Military Academy at West Point, New York. He is responsible for all aspects of the international relations program—one of the Academy’s largest undergraduate majors. COL Parker also chairs the Academy’s Scholarship Committee, which selects and prepares cadets to compete for post-graduate programs to include the Rhodes, Marshall, Truman, and Gates Scholarships and the East-West Center Fellowship. In addition to his academic leadership and governance responsibilities, he provides analytical support on national security issues to Department of the Army. He also serves as an Adjunct Associate Professor in the Columbia University School of International and Public Affairs. His teaching and research areas include International Relations, Security Studies, American Foreign Policy, Politics and Film, Mass Media, and East Asian Politics. COL Parker is the author or editor of numerous texts, book chapters, articles, reviews, and conference papers.

COL Parker served as a member of the advisory committees for the Museum of Television and Radio Satellite Seminar Series “Learning From The Last War: The Media and The Military” and “9/11: The Media Responds.” He appeared in the Stephen Ives film *Reporting America At War*, which aired on PBS in November, 2003. COL Parker is chair of the International Security Studies Section of the International Studies Association and is also on the Governing Councils for the Conference Group on Politics and Film, the Foreign Policy Section, and the International Security and Arms Control Section of the American Political Science Association.

A graduate of the University of Arizona, COL Parker earned masters’ degrees in both political communication and public affairs from Arizona State University, an MA in international relations from the University of Southern California, and a PhD in international relations from Columbia. He is also a graduate of the Naval War College. During the 2002-2003 academic year, COL Parker served as a Visiting Research Fellow at Princeton University’s Center of International Studies.

Prior to his most recent West Point assignment, COL Parker served as operations, plans, and training officer (S3) for the U.S. Army's tactical airborne psychological operations battalion. He took part in operational planning for RESTORE HOPE and other humanitarian assistance and peacekeeping missions. He previously served as commander of the unit responsible for U.S. Army and Joint Service psychological operations training and doctrine development. In that capacity, COL Parker oversaw the post-Cold War redesign of psychological operations training and the revision of the U.S. Army's psychological operations doctrine manual. Commissioned as an infantry officer through the Reserve Officer Training Corps (ROTC), he began his military career in Wiesbaden, Germany where he served as a mechanized infantry platoon leader, staff officer, and company commander.

COL Parker’s previous civilian experience includes service as a congressional aide and as a political campaign consultant. He is a Japan Society U.S.-Japan Leadership Fellow and a member of the Council on Foreign Relations. COL Parker is married to COL (retired) Ila Corinne Bridges (United States Army Judge Advocate General’s Corps).
